AN ACT RELATIVE TO CIVICS EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 2 of Chapter 71 of the General Laws is amended, in line 3, by striking the
2 words “in all public high schools” and inserting the words “from sixth to twelfth grade in all public
3 schools”; and is further amended in line 2, by inserting after the words “United States” the following:

4 “the articles of confederation, the history of the political climate that led to the American
5 Revolution, the federal structure which emphasizes the vertical separation of powers and the relationship
6 of the constitutions of the commonwealth and county”; and is further amended in line 7, by adding after
7 the words “duties of citizenship.” The following:

8 “Course material shall be taught as originally drafted with no intentional omissions of the
9 original intent of the founding fathers. The teaching of a revisionist form of history shall be considered
10 invalid.

11 “The successful completion of a course in civics during the twelfth grade year shall be
12 mandated as a requirement for all students in order to receive their high school diploma.

14 “SECTION 2. The department shall take all reasonable efforts to accomplish the establishment of
15 necessary regulations by June 30, 2010, in order that the provisions of this act may be implemented in the
16 following school year.”

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
